











When to Worry About Speech Delays

Every child develops differently... but early awareness matters. If your child is falling behind on key milestones, a short screening can clarify whether they just need time, or targeted support.

RED FLAGS TO WATCH FOR

-  By 12 months – No babbling (“ba-ba,” “ma-ma”).
-  By 18 months – Fewer than 10 words.
-  By 2 years – Not combining 2 words (“want juice”).
-  By 3 years – Hard for family to understand most speech.
-  Any age – Regression (losing words they once used).

WHAT TO DO NEXT

-  Check hearing (a simple ear infection can delay progress).
-  Provide rich language exposure—narrate daily life.
-  Reach out for a professional speech evaluation.

Early intervention works best; the earlier we start, the faster kids thrive.
